Information from Joan M. Reznicek, Superintendent of Schools

The month of October is right around the corner and so is the end of the first quarter of the 2011-2012 school year, Friday, October 14th to be exact. The first quarter of the school year has been full of new experiences for all teachers, staff, and students at Ponca Public School with a new high school building and new teachers. Hopefully the first quarter grading period will demonstrate the smooth transition all of the students have made to the new surroundings with improved grades.

Parent-Teacher Conferences at Ponca Elementary and High School were held on Tuesday, September 27th. If you were not able to attend the conferences due to a conflict in schedules, I stress that you call your child's teacher(s) and discuss grades, motivation in the classroom, and/or any improvements that could take place to solve any problems. If we take care of small problems now, the difference could improve motivation, attitude, and grades. Your child's grades today may affect their entrance into college later. So let's make sure your son or daughter has a great start to the school year with outstanding grades!!

Parent-Teacher Conferences for Jackson Elementary in Jackson are scheduled for Thursday, November 3rd from 4:00 to 8:00 p.m. Please attend!

As the cold weather approaches, please make sure your elementary child is dressed appropriately for recess. They should have a coat, mittens, hat and boots. As well as the high school students, they need to have necessary clothing as they are driving to school in case they have vehicle problems. We want to keep our students as healthy as possible. All of our classrooms have sanitizing wipes to clean the desks and a sanitizer for the hands.

As a school district, we are required to practice different emergency drills. For example, during the first two weeks of the school year, we must have experienced two fire drills which we accomplished. The school district must have one fire drill on a monthly basis with exception to the harsh winter weather. We will also practice a lock-down drill along with an evacuation drill both from the school and with students on a bus. The District has designated the following evacuation sites for our students:

Jackson Elementary: Faculty and students will evacuate to Providence Hall

Ponca Elementary: Faculty and students will evacuate to the Ponca Community Center.

Ponca High School (Grades 7 - 9): Faculty and students will evacuate to the Ponca Methodist Church.

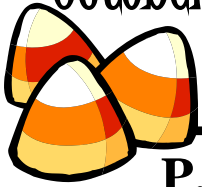
Ponca High School (Grades 10 - 12): Faculty and students will evacuate to Christ the King Church.

All teachers and staff will accompany the students to these designated sites providing supervision and taking attendance to insure that all students are accounted for during the drills.

P.S.A.T. Test for Juniors

The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) is scheduled for the morning of Wednesday, October 12, 2011.

This test is administered annually through the guidance office to those juniors who have voluntarily registered (and paid) for it. The purpose of the PSAT is twofold: 1. The test is designed for students who plan to enroll in a four-year college. It provides them with practice for the Scholastic Aptitude Test-S.A.T. (a college entrance test) which they may take during their senior year. 2. The PSAT serves as a pre-determinant in qualifying for the National Merit Scholarship. In the event a student scores high enough on the PSAT he/she is then eligible to apply for the National Merit Scholarship. If your son or daughter has registered for the PSAT, please remind them that a good night's sleep and breakfast prior to the test are helpful test-taking tips over which they have control! If you have questions or comments concerning the PSAT contact Mrs. Hassler at the school.

PLAN Test for Sophomores

The PLAN Test is scheduled for the morning of Wednesday, October 5, 2011. This test is administered annually through the guidance office to all sophomores at P.H.S. The purpose of the PLAN is twofold: 1. The PLAN is designed as a practice test for those sophomores who consider enrolling in college following high school graduation. This test provides sophomores with practice for the American College Test (A.C.T.) which they may take as juniors or seniors. Four-year colleges in the Midwest require A.C.T. scores as one of several entrance requirements. 2. The PLAN provides the student with feedback on his/her study skills and provides him/her with an interest inventory which gives clues to the kinds of occupations he/she might like. This career information is used in a career unit (in English class) during the spring semester. The school pays for the cost of this test. Parents, please remind your son or daughter that a good night's sleep and a healthy breakfast prior to test time would be a great benefit to them. If you have questions or comments concerning the PLAN contact Mrs. Hassler at the school.

. . . THE MONTH TO INTRODUCE MAP ASSESSMENTS. The type of achievement test administered at Ponca School will change this year. Students in elementary and secondary grades will no longer be writing the Iowa Test of Basic Skills in the spring. Instead students in grades 3-12 will be administered MAP tests three times a year (fall, winter, and spring.) MAP is the acronym for "Measures of Academic Progress". This is a computerized test offered in Reading, Language Usage, Mathematics and Science. The test is used to measure your child's progress or growth in school. The test results are important to teachers because they keep track of progress and growth in basic skills. Teachers use this information to help them guide instruction in the classroom.

. . . THE MONTH FOR STAFF DEVELOPMENT. Be sure your calendar includes the two staff development dates scheduled for Ponca School. The first day, Thursday, October 13, students will be dismissed at 1:15 P.M. The elementary teachers will be working with a reading representative to learn more about implementing their new reading series. The secondary staff will be trained to use the smart boards that soon will be installed in classrooms. The second staff development day is Friday, October 21. School will not be in session for students this day. The PK-12 staff will continue to write the curriculum guides for mathematics or their own curricular area if they do not teach math.

ELEMENTARY NEWS

The first month of school has passed and everything is going smoothly. The students and staff have settled into their routines and everyone is working hard. Midterm grades have been sent and Halloween decorations are popping up around the building, October must be here.

On October 13th we will be dismissing school early for a teacher in-service. School in Jackson will be dismissed at 12:55 and school in Ponca will be dismissed at 1:15. Please make the necessary arrangements for after school care for your child.

Homecoming festivities begin October 1st with the coronation and dance. The elementary will not participate in the dress-up days during the week but will be participating in the blue and white day on Friday, Oct. 7th. The elementary will also participate in the victory march and pep rally on Friday, Oct. 7th depending on weather and time.

As the weather begins to change indoor activities become more prevalent. Organizations and individuals wanting to use the school building should make sure their events are on the school calendar and they have the school usage forms filled out in advance. Availability of the gyms could be limited because of one gym in Ponca.

The end of the first quarter is Friday, October 14th. Parent-Teacher Conferences are scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 3rd from 4:00 to 7:30pm in Jackson. Please make every effort to attend the conferences; it is one of the best ways to stay informed about your child's education.

The Hy Vee receipt program has been very good to us the past couple of years. We have received nearly \$900 dollars from the program. The proceeds from this program have purchased books, playground equipment, and help fund our spring field trip. Please save your receipts and bring them to school.

Even though school is going smoothly there are some areas that need to be tweaked. We are still having a problem with students remaining on the school grounds after school is dismissed for the day. School is dismissed in Jackson at 3:10 and in Ponca at 3:25. The school premises are monitored until approximately 3:20 in Jackson and 3:35 in Ponca. After 3:20 and 3:35 the teachers have other responsibilities to take care of. Students remaining on the school grounds after 3:20 and 3:35 are not supervised and injuries can happen. When school is dismissed students should leave the premises in a timely manner. If you are going to be late to pick students up after school, if possible, please call or make appropriate arrangements.

Another area of concern is tardy students. Please make an effort to make sure your children are on time for school. Please remember students can enter the building at 8:15am in Jackson and 8:10am in Ponca. School begins at 8:30am in Jackson and 8:15am in Ponca. This helps to teach them responsibility and punctuality, two areas necessary to being successful in school and society.

Please check into the office when entering the building. We are having problems with parents entering the building without checking in. We are trying to make sure our buildings are safe and secure. Checking into the building helps us keep track of who is in the building. Please pick up your children outside the building when school is dismissed. There is enough congestion in the halls without adding more people.

We are having a problem with the 4th, 5th, and 6th grade students dressing for physical education classes. They have been warned multiple times and we are still seeing the problem. The PE teachers have been instructed to give students a "0" for not participating in PE each day the student does not dress. If your child is ill or injured please send a note to excuse them for the day.

Problems with logging into PowerSchool

There have been several families that have experienced difficulty logging into powerschool since our last upgrade. If you are having problems make sure your Mozilla Firefox is updated to at least to 6.02 or 7.0 (open Mozilla Firefox and click on Help on the menu bar and then click on About you will see the version of Mozilla you have installed). If the version is lower than 6.02 you need to update by going to the school website and clicking on the technology tab and choosing download link on the left side of the webpage . This will take you to the Mozilla website where you can download the newer version. After downloading you need to install the newer version.

Secondly you need to update your java! Go to the technology page again on the school website and click on downloads that will take you to the java site. Download the java software and then install.

Once you have done this restart your browser and try to get into your child's powerschool. If the problem persists you need to clear out the temporary files from the browser by following the steps below:



Parent/Guardian Access to PowerSchool Create Your Single login for families

With single sign-on access parents/guardians can now have access to all their children in the Ponca School District.


To get started, you must go to the Powerschool Parent Portal from the Ponca School Website

www.poncaschool.org Click on the button . Do not login--click on the blue Create Account button. You must fill in the following information.

1. Enter your first name.
2. Enter your last name.
3. Enter your email address.
4. User name you want to use when logging into powerschool
5. A password you want to use (must be at least 6 characters long)
6. Re-enter the password

To link students to your account

1. Enter the first and last name of the student you want to add to your account (regardless of the name you enter, the system will populate the name based on the access ID and password for the student).
2. Enter the unique access ID (it will be the first and last name with no space of each child followed with a p).
3. Enter the unique access password (parent password)
4. Indicate how you are related to the student by choosing the appropriate association from the pop-up menu.
5. Click Enter---The login page appears.

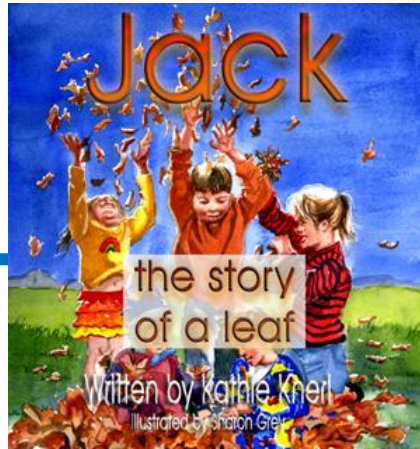
Parent Portal

1. Main Menu: Grades and Attendance, teacher comments, school daily bulletins, lunch balance, add student to your parent/guardian account
2. Student tabs: The first names of the students associated to your parent/guardian account appear in alphabetical order. Click the name of the student for whom you want to view information.
3. Your name: the first and last name of the person logged in. Your name should appear, if it does not contact Kristie Hayes our PowerSchool Administrator at 402-755-5700.
4. Login: In an effort to ensure that your account is secure and your information protected, the date and time of the last time you logged in appears next to your name. If you hover over the date and time, you can view how your last session ended by logging out, timing out, or logging off due to multiple concurrent logins. You will not see how your last session ended, if it ended for any other reason, such as a server rest.
5. Printer icon: Click to print a printer friendly version of the page you are viewing Help icon: Click to view page-specific online help.
6. Logout: make sure to click logout of the parent portal.

Over the past few years, the State of Nebraska's Dept. of Education has been in the process of developing a set of core state learning standards that students should achieve.

Following is a parents' common core standards guide which has been adopted by forty-four U.S. states (Nebraska not yet included) and was developed in collaboration with teachers, school administrators and experts to provide a clear and consistent framework to prepare our children for college and the workforce and give parents an understanding of the knowledge and skills students should learn from kindergarten through twelfth grade:

A Parent's Guide to the Common Core Standards

Currently, each state has a separate set of education standards, lists of skills that students are expected to do by the time they graduate each grade. However, in response to concerns about American student achievement and just how prepared students are for college and careers, education leaders in 48 states, along with the National Governors Association and the Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO), have written a set of standards for student across the U.S. The common core state standards were released in 2010. Now, 44 states are working to implement them by 2013-2014. Here's what you should know and how to help your child prepare for the common core:

The Common Core Standards are State-Driven

The common core state standards are a set of learning skills that all American students should achieve, not a federal curriculum. They set the benchmarks and guidelines for what each student should learn, not how or what teachers teach.

Parent Tip: Find out if your state has adopted the common core at the common core standards web site...<corestandards.org/in-the-states>.

The Standards are a Progression

- In general, standards set a progression of skills that students learn as they move through school. Kindergartners work on phonics and letter sounds, while eighth graders work on building vocabulary and reading fluency.

Parent Tip: Look through the common core standards to get a feel for what your child will be learning as he moves through school. You can read the English-language arts standards and the math standards at the common core web site...<corestandards.org/the-standards>.

Students will Delve Deeper into Core Concepts

- One complaint about separate state standards was the concern from teachers that students were learning about too many topics in a year to fully understand them, says Carrie Phillip, CCSSO program director of common core standards implementation. The common core state standards, on the other hand, focus on the most important topics that students need to know. In math, that means that students focus on really understanding numbers in elementary school before they start to apply that understanding of numbers to data in middle school.

Parent Tip: As your child completes homework, help them hone in on the most important aspects and core concepts.

The Reading Standards will Get More Difficult

- As the common core is implemented, students will be expected to read more difficult text sooner, and discuss what they read at a more complex level. For example, instead of pulling out individual text elements, such as characters, plot, and setting, students will be reading or listening to various stories, and will compare stories using their understanding of text elements.

Parent Tip: As you read with your child, ask her in-depth why and how questions that encourage her to analyze and synthesize texts. For example, read three different versions of the Goldilocks and the Three Bears and ask your child to compare and contrast them as you read. Also, as you build your child's library, see Appendix B for book ideas...<corestandards.org/assets/Appendix_B.pdf>.

Focus on Informational Text

To prepare students for college-level work, there will be more of a focus on informational and expository text. In middle school especially, students will be reading informational text, including original documents, from the Declaration of Independence to presidential speeches.

Parent Tip: Encourage your child to research a topic he's interested in using informational texts and original documents.

Assessments Will Change

- Compared to current achievement tests, common core assessments will likely be more difficult. Ideally, instead of multiple choice tests, students will be analyzing and synthesizing information, writing essay responses, and answering in-depth questions to show how much they understand.

Parent Tip: Ask your child to explain or show how they're solving problems. Then, have them think of multiple ways to solve a math problem, or answer a reading discussion question.

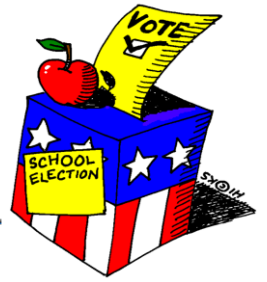
Focus on Practical Skills

- The common core standards were designed with the workplace in mind. So, students will be working on taking the role of scientists, historians, researchers, and more. For example, says Bill McCallum, co-author of the standards and professor at the University of Arizona, the standards "describe what a mathematical practitioner does, make sense of problems, persevere and solve them, and critique the reasoning of others."

Parent Tip: As your child works through his homework, ask him how someone might use what he's working on in "real life." Help connect thinking in school to thinking at work by explaining how you solve problems, or use math every day.

As the common core state standards start to be implemented in schools, there will be some changes, but many things will stay the same. The most important aspect, as always, is to stay in contact with your child's teacher to find out how you can support this latest educational advancement at home.

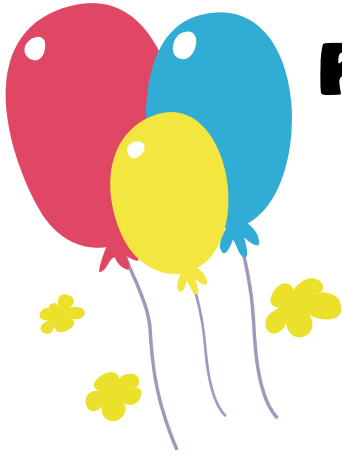
