

DISTRICT DESCRIPTION

The Ponca Public Schools is an accredited PK-12 public school district located in Northeast Nebraska. With an enrollment of approximately 460 students, the district is large enough to offer outstanding educational opportunities, and small enough to personalize education for each student. The district is comprised of 2 schools: Jackson School, serving students in grades PK-2 and Ponca School, serving students in grades 3-12. Competent and caring teachers provide outstanding learning opportunities and place high expectations on their classes. Curricular offerings include basic skills instruction for all students and specialized courses in the high school. Teachers participate in Professional Learning Communities to focus on individual student outcomes and develop professionally. Technology plays an important part of each teacher's program with computer-assisted reading and math instruction, computer classes, and industrial technology offerings. The district operates a 1:1 initiative with Chromebooks for every student K-12. The majority of students from Ponca attend two or four year colleges upon graduation. Extra-curricular activities begin in grade seven and include instrumental and vocal music, a wide variety of athletics, drama, speech, FBLA and student government. The Ponca Public Schools enjoys positive working relationships with the City of Ponca, Village of Jackson, Village of Waterbury, Village of Martinsburg, Ponca Community Education Foundation, Better Ponca Community Foundation, Ponca State Park, Ponca Athletic Boosters, Ponca Music Boosters, Ponca Area Community Club, Ponca Ministerial Association, Youth Sports Organizations, Ponca Recreation, local businesses, and many individual patrons.

SCHOOL NUTRITION

The Ponca Public Schools operates 2 kitchens (Jackson and Ponca) for the purpose of preparing and serving School Lunch. The Jackson kitchen is comprised of 2 staff members and the Ponca kitchen is staffed with 4 employees. The district participated in the Educational Service Unit Coordinating Council's Food Cooperative, which provides for lower food and supply prices through the statewide competitive bidding process. The district averaged 336 meals per day with a total of 57,201 meals served for the 2018-19 school year.





IMPROVEMENT GOALS

The Ponca Public School District implements a School Improvement Team who facilitates the direction of teaching and learning in the district. The team meets on a regular basis to review data, explore professional development opportunities, establish goals, and share progress. The School Improvement Team, through a collaborative process established the following goal for the 2018-19 school year:

- Increase literacy across the curriculum
 - Students will improve reading skills in grades K-12
 - Student will improve writing skills in grades K-12


In addition to the above-mentioned goals, the School Improvement Team, in coordination with the AdvancED reviewed developed the following Action Items:

- Develop a plan for technology equipment implementation and rotation in order to improve our practices
- Research, adopt, and implement an instructional model appropriate to our district
- o Improve transparency and communication with stakeholders

ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

Nebraska statute requires the State Board of Education to create a system of accountability combining multiple indicators of school performance. As such, in 2014, the Nebraska Department of Education, after significant input from stakeholders, developed the Accountability for a Quality Education System, Today and Tomorrow, or AQUESTT. AQUESTT represents both an accountability system and a system of support built around six tenets. The six tenents are: (1) Assessment, (2) College, Career, and Civic Ready (3) Educator Effectiveness, (4) Educational Opportunities, and Access, (5) Positive Partnerships, Relationships, and Success, (6) Transitions. The Nebraska Department of Education is maintaining the structure and functionality of AQUESTT for classifying schools and districts. All schools and districts are classified as Excellent, Great, Good, or Needs Improvement. While additional indicators may be added at a later time, the metrics used for classification are (1) Status, (2) Growth, Improvement, Non-Proficiency, (3) Progress Towards English Language Proficiency, (4) 4- and 7-Year Cohort Graduation Rate, and (5) Chronic Absenteeism, Science, Evidence-based Analysis. Below are the 2018-19 classifications for the Ponca Public Schools, and each individual school.

2018-2019 Year In Review

The 2018-2019 school year was another fantastic year in the Ponca Public Schools! Once again, the district operated two school buildings, Jackson School (PreK-2) and Ponca School, 3-12. The district enrollment for the year was 466. Jackson School's enrollment was 121 students, Ponca Elementary, grades 3-6, was 133, and the Junior/Senior High School was 212 students.

New faculty members for the 2018-2019 school year were Ms. Dacia Beyke, Family & Consumer Science, and Mrs. Jill Camargo, Spanish. Mrs. Kari Lowe returned to the district serving as a cooperating teacher in Family and Consumer Science.

Some of the experiences of the 2018-2019 school year included the crowning of Homecoming King Joel Anderson and Queen Taylor Lamprecht on Saturday, October 6, 2018, with the dance following the coronation. The Snowball dance was held on Saturday, January 5, 2019, with Gage McGill being crowned King and Hailey Bellows crowned Queen. Ponca High School, along with the majority of Northeast Nebraska experienced flooding on March 13, 2019. Staff and students all contributed to the cleanup and rearranging of classes while the building was repaired for normal use. Six classrooms and the Library were displaced for three weeks during repairs.

The students of the Ponca Public School District continued the tradition of excellence in the areas of academics, fine arts, and athletics. The vocal music department had three All-State musicians including: Colson Watchorn, Claire Hoesing, and Olivia Hrouda. The instrumental music department qualified a record 23 7th-12th grade students for Class C All-State Band. The art department celebrated many awards and recognitions, including back-to-back Best of Show Awards by Katy Kastning, at the Lewis & Clark Conference Art Show. The Ponca High School Quiz Bowl varsity team earned the Lewis & Clark Conference Championship on November 8, 2018. Cora Jackson, 5th grade, earned first place in the Dixon County Spelling Bee held in Allen on February 13, 2019. With her first place finish, Cora earned a trip to the state Spelling Bee contest held in Omaha. Sophomore Josie Reid was named a World Language Distinguished Scholar in Spanish. Sophomores Brandon Mellick and Caden Schram represented Ponca School at the Hugh O'Brien Youth Leadership Conference (HOBY) at Concordia University in Seward, Nebraska. Junior Nathan Ruhrer was selected as the 2019 Cornhusker Boys State representative in Lincoln, Nebraska. Daityn Chase was selected to attend Junior Law Cadet Academy the the Law Enforcement Training Center in Grand Island, Nebraska. Nebraska Governor Pete Ricketts served as the guest speaker at this year's Veteran's Day program at Ponca School.

The 2018-2019 school year marked the first year of Unified Bowling at Ponca High School. The Unified Bowling team, offered in association with Unified Sports and the Nebraska State Activities Association, was coached by Mr. John Stroud. The volleyball team won the Lewis & Clark Conference regular season championship. The Girls Basketball team won the Lewis & Clark Conference regular season championship, tournament championship, District championship, and earned a trip to the 2019 state tournament held Thursday, February 28,

2019. The Boys Basketball team won the Lewis & Clark Conference regular season championship, District championship, and earned a trip to the 2019 state tournament held March 7-9, 2019, where they earned 3rd place. The Wrestling team qualified two wrestlers, Dalton Anderson and Andrew Daily, for the state tournament, held February 14-16, 2019 in Omaha. At the Lewis & Clark Conference track meet, Mike Logue and Brooke Lanquis earned conference champions in the shot put and the girls 4x400 relay team (Kaci Day, Kai Seneviratne, Kortney Fethkenher, and Hannah Wahls) were also crowned champions. The track team qualified six athletes for the state track meet held in Omaha. Brooke Languis came home with a 7th place finish in the girls Class C shot put. The boys golf team finished 2nd in the Lewis & Clark Conference tournament held in Plainview. Senior Cole Richards qualified for the state golf tournament, held in Kearney.

On May 10, 2019, Ponca High School graduated 34 seniors at the commencement exercises.
